Purpose





All Title 1 Schools are required to hold an annual Title 1 meeting at the beginning of each school year to inform parents/guardians about Title 1 programming and, share how parents/guardians can become involved and participate in the Title 1 program.









What is Title I?

Title I, Part A is a federal program that provides funds to assist schools with high percentages of students from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards.








Niangua Elementary is a Title 1 School, which means that the poverty level, (determined by free and reduced meal counts) is at or above 40%.









Our goal is to ensure that all students, particularly those who are low-achieving, demonstrate proficient and advanced levels of achievement on State academic achievement standards.





How did we decide to use Title 1 funds?



- We analyzed our latest academic, discipline, and attendance data.
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 - We determined the areas of greatest need.
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 - We looked for barriers that prevented our students from making the achievement they needed.
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Title 1.A Requirements

Federal Requirements -Hold at least two meetings a year.

The fall meeting is held to provide families with information about Title 1

A spring meeting is held to evaluate the program and plan for the following school year.

Provide Families the School Parent and Family Engagement Policy, School Parent Compact, and the Every Student Succeeds Act complaint policy.





Seek parent input and make sure parents are receiving the information.



What does the Title 1 Program look like at Niangua?

Literacy and Math Support

Structures are in place to support at-risk students and monitor student learning:

- AimswebPlus is used in grades K-5 for screening and progress monitoring in English Language Arts and Math
 - Shaywitz Dyslexia Screen
 - IXL Diagnostics for ELA and Math
 - Previous Years MAP Data
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Types of Services

*Pull-Out program: Title 1 students receive supplemental instruction from Mrs. Clark (reading) or Mrs. Wells (math) outside of the general classroom during the school day.





*Push-In Program: Title 1 students receive academic interventions within the classroom environment from the classroom teacher and Title 1 teacher.


*After School Targeted Tutoring: Title 1 students may receive intervention beyond the regular day's instructional schedule through after school tutoring.

* Title 1 sponsored Family Nights (Family Game Night, Family Math Night, Science Night)
















Student selection is based on several criteria including various assessments, achievement test scores, achievement level, teacher recommendation, and risk level for not meeting state curriculum performance benchmarks.





Goals for 2022-2023


1. Increase the number of students making learning gains overall in math and reading
 2. Provide direct instructional support to students.
 3. Provide professional development for teachers.
 4. Promote parent education and involvement.
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The schoolwide instructional programs/strategies/interventions will provide opportunities for all children to meet the State's proficient and advanced levels of academic achievement. It is the goal of Niangua Elementary to have 90% of all students at the proficient level in Communication Arts/Math by 2023 and no student below basic as measured by the state assessment. The schoolwide plan is incorporated in the district's CSIP and is an integral part of the district's efforts to improve the educational outcomes for students.

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- Find the best method for you to communicate regularly with your child's teacher(s) and use it.

 - Promote positive use of freetime.
 - Look at the papers your child brings home
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Know Your Parents' Rights





- You have the right to request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher(s) and paraprofessional(s) who are working with your child. You have the right to know when your child is taught by a teacher or substitute teacher for 4 or more consecutive weeks who does not hold a Missouri certificate or certification in the level or subject that s/he has been assigned. You will receive a letter from the school notifying you.
 - You have the right to be informed of your child's level of academic growth on Missouri Assessment Program (MAP). You will receive notification through Parent Portal and a hard copy.
 - You have the right to request state and local educational policy regarding students participation in any mandated assessments.
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You have the right to give input in the planning, reviewing, and implementation of the following:

- School Improvement Plan

You can give input by:

- Joining the School Advisory Council
 - Completing and returning surveys
 - Completing evaluations at the end of parent events
